

ITALY

La Befana and Christmas Celebrations



In Italy, Christmas is full of magic, stories, and family fun. One of the most unique parts of Christmas in Italy is the story of La Befana, celebrated on January 5th, the night before Epiphany. According to legend, La Befana is a kind old woman who flies on a broomstick and brings gifts to children. 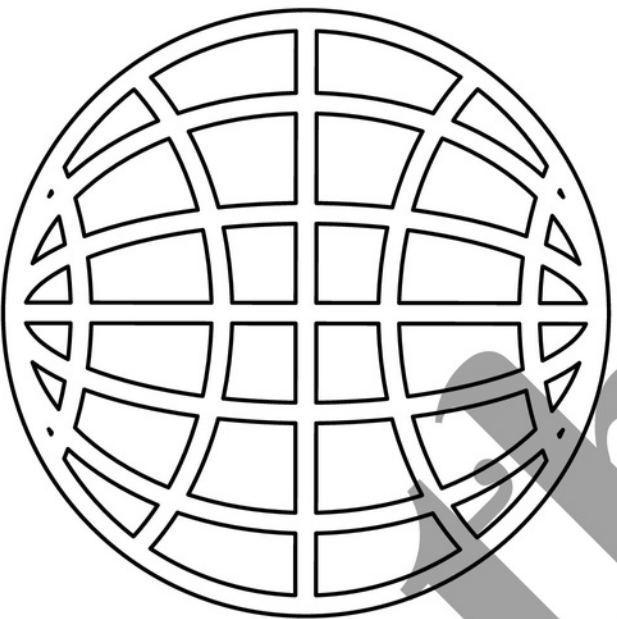
